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# **Agents Corner**

### 2022 Eastern Shore Household Water Testing Clinic

Accomack and Northampton County VCE Offices held their annual well water testing clinic in June and 116 samples were collected. In August, participants received their results and the lab found that a few samples had elevated chloride in the sample. Chloride is a nuisance contaminant, and EPA suggests that public systems keep chloride levels below



250 mg/L. There is no health-based level for chloride, although excessive chloride can produce a salty taste. Overall the samples sent to the VT Lab in Blacksburg did not show any elevated levels of contaminates. A good report from the lab! IF you'd like to see more results, please look at the well water summaries attached to this newsletter. Funding for Eastern Shore water analysis in 2022 was provided through an EPA grant and our partnership with Southeast Rural Community Assistance Project (SERCAP). SERCAP provides technical assistance and financial assistance in the form of loans or grants for well owners to repair or replace their wells, and sometimes funding is available for water treatment devices.

### 2022 Eastern Shore Pest Monitoring Program

We have been monitoring corn earworm and armyworm for the past two months and will continue to do so for another week or so. Northampton County has seen heavy corn earworm pressure in some spots while Accomack's fall armyworm numbers are starting to creep higher. As we move into corn harvest, don't forget to continue to sweep your soybean fields for armyworm infestations. We would like to thank Helene Doughty, at the ESAREC, for contributing her scouting numbers to our weekly report.

### Italian Ryegrass Prevention Workshop

The Italian Ryegrass Prevention Workshop was held at the Eastern Shore AREC on Wednesday, August 31<sup>st</sup>. Thank you to Dr. Michael Flessner, Weed Science Specialist, for coming from Blacksburg to talk on this very timely topic! Attendees that represented over 11,000 tillable acres learned from Drs. Flessner and Singh about chemical and non-chemical measures used to control Italian Ryegrass in wheat. Additional thank you's go out to Horizon Farm Credit and Scott Insurance for sponsoring breakfast biscuits and coffee from Liv's café.

### Farm Tour – Accomack & Northampton County

Accomack and Northampton County Cooperative Extension offices are in the middle of Farm Tour planning. 
September 10th marks the full corn moon since this is typically the time of corn harvesting. Or when the moon occurs closer to the fall equinox, it's referred to as the harvest moon.

# Virginia Ag Expo

We had a great time visiting with growers, industry, government, and other stakeholders interested in Virginia agriculture at the Virginia Ag Expo in early August at Mill Creek Farms @ Camden in Port Royal, VA.
